ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION

of

CHRIST CHURCH STUDENTS' UNION

BACKGROUND

- A. Christ Church Students' Union (the "Union") is a students' union within the meaning of the Education Act 1994. The Union is devoted to the educational interests and welfare of its Student Members.
- B. The Union will seek at all times to:
 - (i) ensure that the diversity of its Student Membership is recognised and that equal access is available to all Student Members of whatever origin or orientation;
 - (ii) pursue its aims and objectives independent of any political party or religious group; and
 - (iii) pursue equal opportunities by taking positive action within the law to facilitate participation of groups discriminated against by society.
- C. These Articles have been structured to give the Board of Trustees reasonable authority to manage the affairs of the Union in a professional manner. The Student Members enjoy the right, which must be exercised in accordance with charity law, to elect a proportion of the Trustees and to dismiss all of the Trustees. The Board of Trustees will give the utmost consideration to the views of Student Members.
- D. Under the Education Act 1994, Canterbury Christ Church University has a statutory duty to ensure that the Union operates in a fair and democratic manner and is held to proper account for its finances. The Union therefore works alongside Canterbury Christ Church University in ensuring that the affairs of the Union are properly conducted and that the educational and welfare needs of the Union's Student Members are met.

PART 1: KEY CONSTITUTIONAL PROVISIONS

1. Definitions and Interpretation

- 1.1 The meanings of any defined terms used in these Articles are set out in Article 58. If any dispute arises in relation to the interpretation of these Articles or any of the Bye-Laws, it shall be resolved by the Board of Trustees.

2. Name

- 2.1 The name of the company is Christ Church Students' Union. In these Articles it is called "the Union".

3. Registered office

- 3.1 The registered office of the Union is situated in England and Wales.

4. Objects

- 4.1 The Union's charitable objects are the advancement of education of students at Canterbury Christ Church University for the public benefit by:
- 4.1.1 being acknowledged as the recognised representative body for all students enrolled on a recognised programme of study at Canterbury Christ Church University;
 - 4.1.2 promoting the interests of students at Canterbury Christ Church University during their course of study and representing, supporting and advising Members;
 - 4.1.3 being acknowledged as the recognised representative channel between the students and the University and a representative channel between the students and any other external bodies;
 - 4.1.4 providing social and recreational activities for Members;
 - 4.1.5 promoting cooperation with other universities and colleges and the local community;
 - 4.1.6 promoting the welfare and individual development of Members and providing advice services relating to educational and welfare issues;
 - 4.1.7 raising funds for other charitable organisations.

5. Powers

- 5.1 To further its objects, but not to further any other purpose, the Union may:
- 5.1.1 provide services and facilities for Student Members;
 - 5.1.2 establish, support, promote, and operate a network of student activities for Student Members;

- 5.1.3 support any RaG or similar fundraising activities carried out by Student Members for charitable causes, including the provision of administrative support, banking facilities, and acting as a holding trustee of any funds raised; and
- 5.1.4 alone or with other organisations:
 - i. carry out campaigning activities;
 - ii. seek to influence public opinion; and
 - iii. make representations to and seek to influence governmental and other bodies and institutions.
- 5.2 Regarding the reform, development, and implementation of appropriate policies, legislation and regulations, provided that all such activities shall be confined to the activities which an English and Welsh charity may properly undertake and provided that the Union complies with the Education Act and any guidance published by the Charity Commission;
 - 5.2.1 provide or procure the provision of advice, counselling, and guidance;
 - 5.2.2 write, make, commission, print, publish, or distribute materials or information in any medium or assist in these activities;
 - 5.2.3 promote, initiate, develop, or carry out education and training and arrange, provide, or assist with exhibitions, lectures, meetings, seminars, displays, or classes;
 - 5.2.4 promote, encourage, carry out, or commission research, surveys, studies, or other work, making the useful results available;
 - 5.2.5 provide, or appoint others to provide, advice, guidance, representation, and advocacy;
 - 5.2.6 enter into contracts to provide services to or on behalf of other bodies;
 - 5.2.7 cooperate with other charities, voluntary bodies, statutory authorities, and other bodies and exchange information and advice with them;
 - 5.2.8 establish and support, or aid in the establishment and support of, any other organisations and subscribe, lend, or guarantee money or property for charitable purposes;
 - 5.2.9 become a member, associate, or affiliate of or act as trustee or appoint trustees of any other organisation (including without limitation any charitable trust of permanent endowment property held for any of the charitable purposes included in the Union's objects);
 - 5.2.10 undertake and execute charitable trusts;
 - 5.2.11 amalgamate or merge with, or acquire or undertake all or any of the property, liabilities, and engagements of any body;
 - 5.2.12 pay out of the funds of the Union the costs of forming and registering the Union;
 - 5.2.13 accept (or disclaim) gifts of money and any other property;
 - 5.2.14 raise funds by way of subscription, donation, or otherwise;

- 5.2.15 acquire or rent any property of any kind and any rights or privileges in and over property and construct, maintain, alter, and equip any buildings or facilities;
- 5.2.16 dispose of or deal with all or any of its property, with or without payment, and subject to such conditions as the Trustees think fit (in exercising this power the Union must comply as appropriate with the Charities Act 2011);
- 5.2.17 borrow, or raise and secure the payment of money, for any purpose including for the purposes of investment or of raising funds, including charging property as security for the repayment of money borrowed, or as security for a grant or the discharge of an obligation (the Union must comply as appropriate with the Charities Act 2011 if it wishes to mortgage land);
- 5.2.18 make grants or loans of money and give guarantees;
- 5.2.19 set aside funds for special purposes or as reserves against future expenditure, and impose restrictions, which may be revocable or irrevocable, on the use of any property of the Union, including (without limitation) by creating permanent endowment;
- 5.2.20 invest and deal with the Union's money not immediately required for its objects in or upon any investments, securities, or property;
- 5.2.21 delegate the management of investments to an appropriately experienced and qualified Financial Expert provided that:
- i. the investment policy is set down in writing for the Financial Expert by the Trustees;
 - ii. every transaction is reported in a timely manner to the Trustees;
 - iii. the performance of the investments is reviewed regularly by the Trustees;
 - iv. the Trustees are entitled to cancel the delegation at any time;
 - v. the investment policy and the delegation arrangements are reviewed regularly;
 - vi. all payments due to the Financial Expert are on a scale or at a level which is agreed in advance and are notified in a timely manner to the Trustees on receipt; and
 - vii. the Financial Expert may not do anything outside the powers of the Trustees;
- 5.2.22 arrange for investments or other property of the Union to be held in the name of a nominee or nominees and pay any reasonable fee required;
- 5.2.23 lend money and give credit to, take security for such loans or credit and guarantee or give security for the performance of contracts by any person or company;
- 5.2.24 open and operate bank accounts and other facilities for banking and draw, accept, endorse, negotiate, discount, issue, or execute negotiable instruments such as promissory notes or bills of exchange;
- 5.2.25 trade in the course of carrying out any of its objects and carry on any other trade which is not expected to give rise to taxable profits;

- 5.2.26 incorporate and acquire subsidiary companies to carry on any trade;
- 5.2.27 subject to Article 6 (Limitation on private benefits):
- i. engage and pay employees, consultants, and professional or other advisers; and
 - ii. make reasonable provision for the payment of pensions and other retirement benefits to or on behalf of employees and former employees of the Union and to their spouses and dependants;
- 5.2.28 insure the property of the Union against any foreseeable risk and take out other insurance policies as are considered necessary by the Trustees to protect the Union;
- 5.2.29 provide indemnity insurance for the Trustees or any other officer of the Union in accordance with, and subject to the conditions in, Section 189 of the Charities Act 2011 (provided that in the case of an officer who is not a Trustee, the second and third references to “charity trustees” in the said Section 189 shall be treated as references to officers of the Charity); and
- 5.2.30 do all such other lawful things as may further the Union’s objects.

6. Limitation on private benefits

- 6.1 The income and property of the Union shall be applied solely towards the promotion of its objects.
- 6.2 Except as provided below, no part of the income and property of the Union may be paid or transferred directly or indirectly by way of dividend, bonus or otherwise by way of profit to any Company Law Member. This shall not prevent any payment in good faith by the Union of:
- 6.2.1 any payments made to any Company Law Member in their capacity as a beneficiary of the Union;
 - 6.2.2 reasonable and proper remuneration to any Company Law Member for any goods or services supplied to the Union provided that if such Company Member is a Trustee Article 6.3 shall apply;
 - 6.2.3 interest on money lent by any Company Law Member to the Union at a reasonable and proper rate; and
 - 6.2.4 any reasonable and proper rent for premises let by any Company Law Member to the Union.
- 6.3 Except as provided below, no Trustee may sell goods, services or any interest in land to the Union; be employed by, or receive any remuneration from, the Union; or receive any other financial benefit from the Union. This shall not prevent any payment in good faith by the Union of:
- 6.3.1 any payments made to any Trustee or Connected Person in their capacity as a beneficiary of the Union;

- 6.3.2 reasonable and proper out of pocket expenses of the Trustees;
- 6.3.3 reasonable and proper remuneration to any Sabbatical Trustee or Connected Person for any goods or services supplied to the Union on the instructions of the Trustees provided that:
- i. for the avoidance of doubt, the authorisation under this provision shall extend to the remuneration of Sabbatical Trustees and Connected Persons under contracts of employment with the Union;
 - ii. subject to Article 6.3.3.i, the authorisation under this provision shall not extend to the service of acting as Trustee;
 - iii. if the person being remunerated is a Trustee the procedure described in Article 46 (Conflicts of Interest) must be followed in considering the appointment of the Trustee and in relation to any other decisions regarding the remuneration authorised by this provision;
 - iv. if the person being remunerated is a Connected Person the procedure described in Article 46 (Conflicts of Interest) must be followed by the relevant Trustee in relation to any decisions regarding such Connected Person;
 - v. this provision may not apply to more than half of the Trustees in any financial year (and for these purposes such provision shall be treated as applying to a Trustee if it applies to a person who is a Connected Person in relation to that Trustee); and
 - vi. at all times the provisions of the Education Act are complied with;
- 6.3.4 interest on money lent by any Trustee or Connected Person to the Union at a reasonable and proper rate;
- 6.3.5 any reasonable and proper rent for premises let by any Trustee or Connected Person to the Union:
- i. reasonable and proper premiums in respect of indemnity insurance effected in accordance with Article 5.2.29;
 - ii. any payments made to any Trustee or officer under the indemnity provisions set out at Article 57 (Indemnity); and
 - iii. any payments authorised in writing by the Charity Commission.
- 6.4 In Articles 6.2 and 6.3, references to the Union shall be read as references to the Union and/or any Subsidiary Company.
- 6.5 Where a vacancy arises on the Board of Trustees with the result that Article 6.3.3 applies to more than half of the Trustees, the Union may continue to pay remuneration to its Sabbatical Trustees and any Connected Persons receiving remuneration in accordance with Article 6.3.3 provided that the Union uses all reasonable endeavours to fill the vacancy as soon as possible.

7. Liability of Company Law Members

- 7.1 The liability of each Company Law Member is limited to £1, being the amount that each Company Law Member undertakes to contribute to the assets of the Union in the event of its being wound up while they are a Company Law Member or within one year after they cease to be a Company Law Member, for:
- 7.1.1 payment of the Union's debts and liabilities contracted before they cease to be a Company Law Member;
 - 7.1.2 payment of the costs, charges, and expenses of winding up; and
 - 7.1.3 adjustment of the rights of the contributories among themselves.

8. Dissolution

- 8.1 If any property remains after the Union has been wound up or dissolved and the debts and liabilities have been satisfied, it may not be paid to or distributed amongst the Members of the Union (except to a Member that is itself a charity), but shall belong to and be held by Canterbury Christ Church University upon trust for the sole and exclusive purpose of a students' union within the meaning of the Education Act whose beneficiary class shall be the registered students of Canterbury Christ Church University. In the event that Canterbury Christ Church University has ceased to exist, the Union shall be wound up or dissolved and any property remaining after the debts and liabilities have been satisfied shall not be paid to or distributed amongst the Members of the Union (except to a Member that is itself a charity), but shall be distributed according to the guidance of the Board of Trustees to another organisation sharing similar aims and objects to Christ Church Students' Union.

9. Reviewing and Amending the Articles

- 9.1 Canterbury Christ Church University shall be required to review the provisions of these Articles at intervals of not more than five (5) years.
- 9.2 Any amendment to the Articles shall require all of the following:
- 9.2.1 The circulation by the Board of Trustees of a proposal to amend the Articles to all the Student Members (the "Proposal");
 - 9.2.2 A period of time (as set out in the Bye-Laws) during which any amendments to the Proposal may be submitted to the Board of Trustees by any Student Member;
 - 9.2.3 The circulation by the Board of Trustees to all the Student Members of a resolution to approve either the Proposal or a revised Proposal incorporating those amendments submitted in accordance with Article 9.2.2 which the Board of Trustees in their absolute discretion have accepted;
 - 9.2.4 A resolution passed at a Student Members' meeting or in a Referendum by a two thirds majority vote approving the Proposal or the revised Proposal (as the case may be);

- 9.2.5 A special resolution of the Company Law Members making the amendments to the Articles that have been approved by resolution of the Student Members in accordance with Article 9.2.4.; and
- 9.2.6 The approval of Canterbury Christ Church University.

PART 2: MEMBERS

10. Members of the Union

- 10.1 The Members of the Union shall be as follows:
- 10.1.1 the Student Members; and
 - 10.1.2 the Company Law Members.
- 10.2 The Union may also have associate members and Special Members in accordance with Article 15.

11. Student Members

- 11.1 The Student Members shall be as follows:
- 11.1.1 each and every Student who has not opted out by notifying Canterbury Christ Church University or the Union in writing of their wish not to be a Student Member; and
 - 11.1.2 the Sabbatical Officers.
- 11.2 The names of the Student Members shall be entered in the register of Student Members.
- 11.3 Student Members shall be entitled to the benefits set out in the Code of Practice.

12. Termination of Student Membership

- 12.1 Student Membership shall not be transferable and shall cease on death. A Student Member shall cease to be a Student Member of the Union if:
- 12.1.1 they cease to be a Student. For the avoidance of doubt, a student is withdrawn or assumed withdrawn from a programme or registration is suspended;
 - 12.1.2 they cease to be a Sabbatical Officer;
 - 12.1.3 they opt out of Student Membership by giving written notice to the University or the Union in accordance with the Bye-Laws; or
 - 12.1.4 a decision is made to remove them from Student Membership of the Union in accordance with the Union's code of conduct established under Article 16.

13. Trustees as Company Law Members

- 13.1 The Trustees from time to time shall be the only Company Law Members.
- 13.2 A Trustee shall become a Company Law Member on becoming a Trustee. In agreeing to become a Trustee, each new Trustee is also agreeing to become a Company Law Member.
- 13.3 The names of the Company Law Members must be entered in the register of Company Law Members.

14. Termination of Company Law Membership

- 14.1 A Company Law Member shall cease to be a Company Law Member if they cease to be a Trustee.
- 14.2 Company Law Membership is not transferable and shall cease on death.

15. Associate Members

- 15.1 The Trustees may establish such classes of associate membership, including Special Membership, with such description and with such rights and obligations as they think fit and may admit and remove such associate members in accordance with the Bye-Laws provided that no such associate members or Special Members appointed under Article 15.2 shall be Members for the purposes of the Articles or the Companies Acts.
- 15.2 Any Member can nominate an individual to be a Special Member of the Union, providing that individual has shown outstanding commitment and service to the Union. Any Member wishing to nominate an individual must submit a request in writing to a Sabbatical Officer at least three working days prior to the advertised date of a Student Members' meeting with the support in writing of twenty four (24) other Members.

16. Code of Conduct

- 16.1 The Board of Trustees will establish and monitor a code of conduct that all Student Members shall be required to adhere to, including when Student Members are involved in activities or at events that are administered or organised by the Union.
- 16.2 The Code of Conduct may include a range of sanctions for breach of the Code of Conduct by a Student Member, including the suspension or removal of any or all of the rights and privileges of Student Membership, including the holding of office.

17. Referenda

- 17.1 A Referendum may be called on any issue by:
 - 17.1.1 a resolution of the Trustees;

17.1.2 a majority vote of the Union Council;

17.1.3 a Secure Petition signed or agreed to by at least 200 Student Members, presented to a Sabbatical Officer; or

17.1.4 in accordance with Article 9.2.4.

17.2 A resolution may only be passed by Referendum if at least 250 Student Members cast a vote in the Referendum and a simple majority of the votes cast are in favour of the resolution.

17.3 Referenda shall be conducted in accordance with these Articles and the Bye-Laws.

17.4 Subject to Article 31.3, the Student Members may set Policy by Referenda. Policy set by Referenda may overturn Policy set by the Union Council and Policy set by the Student Members at a Student Members' Meeting.

18. Student Members' Meetings

18.1 The Union must hold an annual Student Members' Meeting once in each Academic Year which shall be called and held in accordance with the Bye-Laws. The annual Student Members' Meeting shall be held at such time and place as the Trustees shall think suitable to allow the maximum number of Student Members to attend.

18.2 The notice of the annual Student Members' Meeting must state the business to be transacted which shall include:

18.2.1 ratification of minutes of the previous annual Student Members' Meeting;

18.2.2 receiving the report of the Trustees on the Union's activities since the previous annual Student Members' Meeting;

18.2.3 presenting the annual report and financial statements of the Union;

18.2.4 approving the list of affiliations of the Union; and

18.2.5 open questions to the Trustees by the Student Members.

18.3 The Union may hold other Student Members' Meetings in addition to the annual Student Members' Meeting. Such meetings shall be called and held in accordance with the Bye-Laws.

18.4 For the avoidance of doubt, any Student Members' Meeting held under this Article shall not be a Company Law Meeting of the Union for the purposes of the Companies Acts.

19. Company Law Meetings

19.1 The Trustees may call a Company Law Meeting at any time.

19.2 Such meetings must be held in accordance with the provisions regarding such meetings in the Companies Acts.

19.3 A Company Law Meeting is likely to only be required where the Union wishes to pass a company law resolution (other than by way of written resolution) in accordance with the

Articles and/or the Companies Acts, for example a special resolution to amend the Union's Articles of Association.

20. Written Resolutions

- 20.1 Subject to this Article 20, a written resolution agreed by:
- 20.1.1 Company Law Members representing a simple majority; or
 - 20.1.2 (in the case of a special resolution) Company Law Members representing not less than seventy five percent (75%) of the eligible Company Law Members shall be effective.
- 20.2 On a written resolution each Company Law Member shall have one vote.
- 20.3 A written resolution is not a special resolution unless it stated that it was proposed as a special resolution.
- 20.4 A copy of the proposed written resolution must be sent to every eligible Company Law Member together with a statement informing the Company Law Member how to signify their agreement and the date by which the resolution must be passed if it is not to lapse.
- 20.5 In relation to a resolution proposed as a written resolution of the Union the eligible Company Law Members are the Company Law Members who would have been entitled to vote on the resolution on the Circulation Date of the resolution.
- 20.6 The required majority of eligible Company Law Members must signify their agreement to the written resolution within the period of 28 days beginning with the Circulation Date.
- 20.7 Communications in relation to written resolutions must be sent to the Union's auditors in accordance with the Companies Acts.
- 20.8 A Company Law Member signifies their agreement to a proposed written resolution when the Union receives from them (or from someone acting on their behalf) an authenticated document:
- 20.8.1 identifying the resolution to which it relates; and
 - 20.8.2 indicating the Company Law Member's agreement to the resolution.
- 20.9 For the purposes of Article 20.8:
- 20.9.1 a document sent or supplied in Hard Copy Form is sufficiently authenticated if it is signed by the person sending or supplying it; and
 - 20.9.2 a document sent or supplied in Electronic Form is sufficiently authenticated if:
 - i. the identity of the sender is confirmed in a manner specified by the Union; or
 - ii. where no such manner has been specified by the Union, if the communication contains or is accompanied by a statement of the identity of the sender and the Union has no reason to doubt the truth of that statement.
- 20.10 If the Union gives an electronic address in any document containing or accompanying a written resolution, it will be deemed to have agreed that any document or information relating

to that resolution may be sent by Electronic Means to that address (subject to any conditions or limitations specified in the document).

PART 3: TRUSTEES

21. Appointment of Trustees

21.1 The Trustees shall be made up of the following persons:

21.1.1 not more than five (5) Sabbatical Trustees, elected in accordance with Article 22;

21.1.2 not more than six (6) Student Trustees, elected or appointed in accordance with Article 23;

21.1.3 not more than six (6) Community Trustees, appointed in accordance with Article 24; and

21.1.4 not more than one (1) University Trustee, appointed in accordance with Article 25.

21.2 The Board shall determine the required number of trustees to enact its required duties, subject to the limitations in Articles 21.1.1 to 21.1.4.

21.3 Notwithstanding Article 21.1, the combined number of Community Trustees and the University Trustee should not exceed the combined number of Sabbatical Trustees and Student Trustees.

22. Sabbatical Trustees and Officers

22.1 Sabbatical Officers shall be elected by secret ballot by the Student Members at an election to be held in accordance with the Bye-Laws. The Sabbatical Officers shall be elected to posts specified in the Bye-Laws.

22.2 The Sabbatical Officers from time to time shall be the Sabbatical Trustees. Except where otherwise indicated, references in these Articles to "Sabbatical Trustees" are to individuals acting solely in their capacity as Sabbatical Trustees.

22.3 The Sabbatical Officers shall remain in office for a term of one (1) year commencing in accordance with the Bye-Laws. The term of office may be shorter or longer on a transitional basis to coincide with an alteration of the year start or end. Subject to a transitional change in the year of office, a Sabbatical Officer may be re-elected for a maximum further term of one (1) year by the Student Members at an election to be held in accordance with the Bye-Laws. For the avoidance of doubt, a Sabbatical Officer's terms of office may be either consecutive or non-consecutive.

22.4 Each Sabbatical Officer must be a Student or a Sabbatical Officer at the time of their election. In accordance with Article 11, each Sabbatical Officer shall become a Student Member on commencement of their appointment or reappointment as a Sabbatical Officer. Such Student Membership shall cease when the Sabbatical Officer ceases to be a Sabbatical Officer.

- 22.5 The Sabbatical Officers shall be deemed to be “major union office holders” for the purposes of Section 22 of the Education Act.
- 22.6 At the same time as commencing the term of office as a Sabbatical Officer, the Sabbatical Officer will enter into a contract of employment with the Union for a term to be determined by the Bye-Laws. The duties and method of remuneration of each Sabbatical Officer shall be as set out in the Bye-Laws.

23. Student Trustees

- 23.1 Student Trustees may either be elected or appointed, as determined by the Board of Trustees.
- 23.2 Elected Student Trustees shall be elected by secret ballot by the Student Members at an election to be held in accordance with the Bye-Laws.
- 23.3 Appointed Student Trustees shall be appointed by the Appointments Committee by a simple majority vote.
- 23.4 Each Student Trustee must be a Student at the time of their election or appointment and for the duration of their term as a Student Trustee.
- 23.5 Student Trustees shall remain in office for a term of two (2) years commencing in accordance with the Bye-Laws. The term of office may be shorter or longer on a transitional basis to coincide with the alteration of the year start or end.
- 23.6 A Student Trustee may serve a maximum of two terms which for the avoidance of doubt may be either consecutive or non-consecutive.

24. Community Trustees

- 24.1 Community Trustees shall be appointed by a simple majority vote of the Appointments Committee.
- 24.2 Community Trustees shall remain in office for a term of up to three (3) years commencing in accordance with the Bye-Laws.
- 24.3 Community Trustees may serve for a maximum of three (3) terms which may either be consecutive or non-consecutive.

25. University Trustee

- 25.1 Canterbury Christ Church University may, by written notice to the Trustees, nominate a candidate to become the University Trustee.
- 25.2 The candidate nominated by Canterbury Christ Church University may be appointed as the University Trustee by a simple majority vote of the Appointments Committee.
- 25.3 The University trustee shall remain in office for a term of up to three (3) years, and may serve a maximum of three (3) terms which may either be consecutive or non-consecutive.

26. Disqualification, Resignation, and Removal of Trustees

- 26.1 The office of a Trustee shall be vacated if:
- 26.1.1 they cease to be a company director by virtue of any provision of the Companies Act 2006 or is prohibited from being a company director by law;
 - 26.1.2 they are disqualified under the Charities Act 2011 from acting as a trustee of a charity;
 - 26.1.3 in the case of a Sabbatical Trustee, they cease to be a Sabbatical Officer or resigns as an employee of the Union;
 - 26.1.4 in the case of a Student Trustee, they cease to be a Student;
 - 26.1.5 in the case of a Sabbatical Trustee or a Student Trustee, they are removed from Student Membership of the Union in accordance with the Union's Code of Conduct;
 - 26.1.6 in the case of the University Trustee, they are removed from office by the University serving written notice to that effect on the Trustees;
 - 26.1.7 they resign by notice in writing to the Union (but only if at least four Trustees will remain in office when the notice of resignation is to take effect);
 - 26.1.8 the Trustees reasonably believe the Trustee has become physically or mentally incapable of managing their own affairs and they resolve that they be removed from office; and
 - 26.1.9 they fail to attend three consecutive meetings of the Trustees and the Trustees resolve that they be removed for this reason;
 - 26.1.10 they cease to be a Company Law Member; or
 - 26.1.11 they are removed from office under Article 27 or Article 28.

27. Removal of Trustees by the Student Members or the Union Council

- 27.1 The office of a Trustee shall be vacated if:
- 27.1.1 a motion of no confidence in the Trustee is passed by a simple majority of the Student Members voting in a Referendum, provided that at least 250 Student Members cast a vote in the Referendum. Such a motion shall only be triggered by a Secure Petition signed or agreed to by at least 200 Student Members; or
 - 27.1.2 a motion of no confidence in the Trustee is passed by a two thirds majority in a vote of the Union Council. Such a motion shall only be triggered by a Secure Petition signed or agreed to by at least 200 Student Members.

28. Removal of Trustees by the Board

- 28.1 The office of a Community Trustee or the University Trustee shall be vacated if a majority resolution of no confidence in the Trustee is passed by the Trustees. For the avoidance of

doubt, the Trustee concerned and any Trustee who has a conflict of interest in relation to the matter shall not vote on this resolution and the quorum shall be adjusted accordingly in accordance with Article 42.

29. Removal of Elected Officers

29.1 An Elected Officer shall be removed from office if they:

29.1.1 resign or die; or

29.1.2 are removed from office as an Elected Officer by:

- i. a motion of no confidence in the Elected Officer passed by a simple majority of the Student Members voting in a Referendum, provided that at least 250 Student Members cast a vote in the Referendum. Such a motion shall only be triggered by a Secure Petition signed or agreed to by at least 200 Student Members; or
- ii. a motion of no confidence in the Elected Officer is passed by a two thirds majority in a vote of the Union Council. Such a motion shall only be triggered by a Secure Petition signed or agreed to by at least 200 Student Members.

29.1.3 Provided that such removal shall be subject to the Union having first carried out any steps it is required to take under the Sabbatical Officers contract of employment and/or the applicable disciplinary procedure and otherwise in accordance with good employment practice.

30. Replacement of Trustees

30.1 If a Sabbatical Trustee resigns, is disqualified, or is removed from office at any time prior to the commencement of the Academic Year, the vacancy that results on the Board of Trustees shall be filled in accordance with the Bye-Laws.

30.2 If a Sabbatical Trustee resigns, is disqualified, or is removed from office after the commencement of the Academic Year (“the Outgoing Sabbatical Trustee”), the vacancy shall be filled in accordance with the Bye-Laws. Any person elected under this Article may be required to assume the responsibilities of the outgoing Sabbatical Trustee.

30.3 If a Student Trustee resigns, is disqualified, or is removed from office, a Student Trustee may be elected or appointed to the vacancy in accordance with Article 23.1.

30.4 If a Community Trustee or a University Trustee resigns, is disqualified, or is removed from office, a Community Trustee or a University Trustee (as appropriate) shall be appointed to the vacancy in accordance with Articles 24 or 25 respectively.

31. Trustees' general authority

- 31.1 The Board of Trustees is responsible for the management and administration of the Union and, subject to the Education Act, these Articles, and the Bye-Laws, may exercise all the powers of the Union.
- 31.2 The Board's powers under Article 31.1 shall include but not be limited to responsibility for:
- 31.2.1 the governance of the Union;
 - 31.2.2 the budget of the Union; and
 - 31.2.3 the strategy of the Union.
- 31.3 The Board of Trustees may override any decision or Policy made by the Student Members at a Student Members' Meeting, or by Referendum, or by the Union Council, which the Trustees consider (in their absolute discretion):
- 31.3.1 has or may have any financial implications for the Union;
 - 31.3.2 is or may be in breach of, contrary to or otherwise inconsistent with, charity or education law or any other legal requirements (including ultra vires);
 - 31.3.3 is not or may not be in the best interests of the Union or all or any of its charitable objects; or
 - 31.3.4 will or may otherwise affect the discharge of any or all of the responsibilities referred to in Article 31.2.
- 31.4 No alteration of these Articles or the Bye-Laws shall invalidate any prior act of the Trustees which would have been valid if that alteration had not been made.
- 31.5 All acts done by a meeting of Trustees, or of a committee of the Trustees, shall be valid, even if it is later discovered that any Trustee who participated in the vote:
- 31.5.1 was not properly appointed;
 - 31.5.2 was disqualified from holding office;
 - 31.5.3 had vacated office; or
 - 31.5.4 was not entitled to vote.

32. Trustees may delegate

- 32.1 Subject to the Articles, the Trustees may delegate any of their powers or functions to any committee.
- 32.2 Subject to the Articles, the Trustees may delegate the implementation of their decisions or day to day management of the affairs of the Union to any person or committee.
- 32.3 Any delegation by the Trustees may be:
- 32.3.1 by such means;
 - 32.3.2 to such an extent;

32.3.3 in relation to such matters or territories; and

32.3.4 on such terms and conditions as they think fit.

32.4 The Trustees may authorise further delegation of the relevant powers, functions, implementation of decisions, or day to day management by any person or committee to whom they are delegated.

32.5 The Trustees may revoke any delegation in whole or part, or alter its terms and conditions.

32.6 The Trustees may, by power of attorney or otherwise, appoint any person to be the agent of the Union for such purposes and on such conditions as they determine.

33. Committees

33.1 In the case of delegation to committees:

33.1.1 the resolution making the delegation must specify those who shall serve or be asked to serve on such committee (although the resolution may allow the committee to make co-options up to a specified number);

33.1.2 subject to Article 33.3, the composition of any committee shall be entirely in the discretion of the Trustees and may include such of their number (if any) as the resolution may specify;

33.1.3 the deliberations of any committee must be reported regularly to the Trustees and any resolution passed or decision taken by any committee must be reported promptly to the Trustees and every committee must appoint a secretary for that purpose;

33.1.4 no committee shall knowingly incur expenditure or liability on behalf of the Union except where authorised by the Trustees or in accordance with a budget which has been approved by the Trustees.

33.2 The Trustees must establish the Appointments Committee in accordance with their powers under Articles 32 and 33.1.

33.3 For the avoidance of doubt, the Trustees may (in accordance with Articles 32 and 33.1) delegate any financial matters to any committee provided that such committee shall include at least one Trustee. The Trustees may empower such committee to resolve upon the operation of any bank account according to such mandate as it shall think fit provided that the signature or agreement of at least one Trustee shall be required for payments above a certain amount as set out in the Bye-Laws and provided always that no committee shall incur or commit to expenditure on behalf of the Union except in accordance with a budget which has been approved by the Trustees.

33.4 The meetings and proceedings of any committee shall be governed by the Articles regulating the meetings and proceedings of the Trustees so far as they apply and are not included in any Bye-Laws.

34. Delegation of day-to-day management powers to the Chief Executive Officer

34.1 In the case of delegation of the day-to-day management of the Union to the Chief Executive Officer:

34.1.1 the delegated power shall be to manage the Union by implementing the policy and strategy adopted by and within a budget approved by the Trustees and if applicable to advise the Trustees in relation to such policy, strategy, and budget;

34.1.2 the Trustees shall provide the Chief Executive Officer with a description of the role and the extent of its authority;

34.1.3 the Chief Executive Officer shall report regularly to the Trustees on the activities undertaken in managing the Union and provide them regularly with management accounts which are sufficient to explain the financial position of the Union; and

34.1.4 the Trustees shall provide the Chief Executive Officer with a performance management structure to aid their work plan and development.

35. Trustees taking decisions collectively

35.1 Subject to legislation, any decision of the Trustees must be either a majority decision at a meeting or a decision taken in accordance with Article 45 (Majority decisions without a meeting).

36. Trustees' meetings

36.1 The Trustees must hold a minimum of four (4) meetings in each Academic Year.

36.2 Guests or observers can attend meetings of the Trustees at the discretion of the Chair of the Meeting.

37. Calling a Trustees' meeting

37.1 Four (4) Trustees may, and the Chief Executive Officer or Secretary at the request of four (4) Trustees must, call a Trustees' meeting.

38. Length of Notice

38.1 A Trustees' meeting must be called by at least seven clear days' notice unless either:

38.1.1 all the Trustees agree; or

38.1.2 urgent circumstances require shorter notice.

39. Contents of Notice

39.1 Every notice calling a Trustees' meeting must specify:

- 39.1.1 the place, day, and time of the meeting;
- 39.1.2 the general particulars of all business to be considered at such meeting; and
- 39.1.3 if it is anticipated that Trustees participating in the meeting will not be in the same place, how it is proposed they should communicate with each other during the meeting.

40. Service of Notice

- 40.1 Notice of Trustees' meetings must be given to each Trustee, but need not be in writing. Notice of Trustees' meeting may be sent by Electronic Means to an address provided by the Trustee for the purpose.

41. Participation in Trustees' meetings

- 41.1 Subject to the Articles, Trustees participate in a Trustees' meeting, or part of a Trustees' meeting, when:
 - 41.1.1 the meeting has been called and takes place in accordance with the Articles; and
 - 41.1.2 they can each communicate to the others any information or opinions they have on any particular item of the business of the meeting (for example via telephone or video conferencing).
- 41.2 In determining whether Trustees are participating in a Trustees' meeting, it is irrelevant where any Trustee is, or the means by which they communicate with each other.
- 41.3 If all the Trustees participating in a meeting are not in the same place, they may decide that the meeting is to be treated as taking place wherever any of them is.

42. Quorum for Trustees' meetings

- 42.1 At a Trustees' meeting, unless a quorum is participating, no proposal is to be voted on, except a proposal to call another meeting.
- 42.2 The quorum for Trustees' meetings shall be one third of the total number of current trustees rounded down to the nearest whole number, but it must never be less than four (4).
- 42.3 Such quorum must include at least two Sabbatical Trustees and/or Student Trustees and one Community Trustee. Where the resolution or issue under discussion concerns a matter in respect of which some or all of the Trustees have a conflict of interest, the quorum shall be four (4).
- 42.4 If the total number of Trustees for the time being is less than the quorum required, the Trustees must not take any decision other than a decision to increase the number of Trustees.

43. Chair and Deputy Chair

- 43.1 Subject to Article 43.3, the Trustees may elect one of their number to be the Chair of the Trustees for a term of one year.
- 43.2 Subject to Article 43.3, the Trustees may elect one of their number to be the Deputy Chair of the Trustees, whose role it will be to assist the Chair, for a term of one year.
- 43.3 At least one of either the Chair or the Deputy Chair shall be a Sabbatical Trustee.
- 43.4 The Chair, or in their absence the Deputy Chair, shall preside as Chair of the Meeting. In the absence of both the Chair and the Deputy Chair, another Trustee appointed by the Trustees present shall preside as Chair of the Meeting.

44. Casting vote

- 44.1 If the numbers of votes for and against a proposal at a Trustees' meeting are equal, the Chair of the Meeting has a casting vote in addition to any other vote they may have.
- 44.2 Article 44.1 does not apply if, in accordance with the Articles, the Chair of the Meeting is not to be counted as participating in the decision-making process for quorum or voting purposes.

45. Majority decisions without a meeting

- 45.1 Subject to legislation, the Trustees may, in the circumstances outlined in this Article, make a simple majority decision without holding a Trustees' meeting if:
 - 45.1.1 a Trustee has become aware of a matter on which the Trustees need to take a decision;
 - 45.1.2 that Trustee has taken all reasonable steps to make all the other Trustees aware of the matter and the decision;
 - 45.1.3 the Trustees have had a reasonable opportunity to communicate their views on the matter and the decision to each other; and
 - 45.1.4 a simple majority of the Trustees vote in favour of a particular decision on that matter.
- 45.2 A decision of the Trustees may be taken by a majority and shall be as valid and effectual as if it had been taken at a Trustees' meeting duly convened and held.
- 45.3 Trustees participating in the taking of a majority decision otherwise than at a Trustees' meeting in accordance with this Article:
 - 45.3.1 may be in different places, and may participate at different times; and
 - 45.3.2 may communicate with each other by any means.
- 45.4 No decision shall be taken by the Trustees in accordance with this Article unless a quorum participates in the decision-making process. The quorum for Trustees' decision-making in accordance with this Article shall be the same as the quorum for Trustees' meetings as set out in Article 42.

- 45.5 The Chair or such other Trustee as shall be appointed by the Trustees shall be the chair of the process of decision-making in accordance with this Article. The process shall include:
- 45.5.1 circulation of the proposed decision with an indication of the time period for discussion and the date by which Trustees are asked to cast their votes;
 - 45.5.2 the nomination of a person to whom all Trustees' votes must be communicated;
 - 45.5.3 if a majority of the Trustees vote in favour of the decision, the nominated person must communicate the decision to all the Trustees and the date of the decision shall be the date on which the vote is cast to bring the number of Trustees voting in favour into the required majority; and
 - 45.5.4 the nominated person must prepare a minute of the decision in accordance with Article 52 (Minutes).
- 45.6 In the case of an equality of votes in any decision-making process in accordance with this Article, the Chair shall be entitled to a casting vote in addition to any other vote they may have but this does not apply if, in accordance with the Articles, the Chair or specified Trustee is not to be counted as participating in the decision-making process for quorum or voting purposes.

46. Conflicts of interest

- 46.1 Unless Article 46.2 applies, a Trustee must declare the nature and extent of:
- 46.1.1 any direct or indirect interest which they have in a proposed transaction or arrangement with the Union; and
 - 46.1.2 any duty, or any direct or indirect interest, which they have that conflicts, or may conflict, with the interests of the Union or their duties to the Union.
- 46.2 There is no need to declare any interest or duty of which the other Trustees are, or ought reasonably to be, already aware.
- 46.3 If a Trustee's interest or duty cannot reasonably be regarded as likely to give rise to a conflict of interest, or a conflict of duties with or in respect of the Union, they are entitled to participate in the decision-making process, to be counted in the quorum, and to vote in relation to the matter. Any uncertainty about whether a Trustee's interest or duty is likely to give rise to a conflict shall be determined by a majority decision of the other Trustees taking part in the decision-making process.
- 46.4 If a Trustee's interest or duty gives rise (or could reasonably be regarded as likely to give rise) to a conflict of interest or a conflict of duties with or in respect of the Union, they may participate in the decision-making process and may be counted in the quorum and vote unless:
- 46.4.1 the decision could result in the Trustee or any person who is Connected with them receiving a benefit other than:

- i. any benefit received in their capacity as a beneficiary of the Union (as permitted under Article 6.3.1) and which is available generally to the beneficiaries of the Union;
- ii. the payment of premiums in respect of indemnity insurance effected in accordance with Article 5.33;
- iii. payment under the indemnity set out at Article 57;
- iv. reimbursement of expenses in accordance with Article 6.3.2; or
- v. a majority of the other Trustees participating in the decision-making process decide to the contrary.

46.4.2 In which case they must comply with Article 46.5.

46.4.3 If a Trustee with a conflict of interest or conflict of duties is required to comply with this Article 46.5, they must:

- i. take part in the decision-making process only to such extent as in the view of the other Trustees is necessary to inform the debate;
- ii. not be counted in the quorum for that part of the process; and
- iii. withdraw during the vote and have no vote on the matter.

46.4.4 Where a Trustee or a person who is Connected with them has a conflict of interest or conflict of duties and the Trustee has complied with their obligations under these Articles in respect of that conflict:

- i. the Trustee shall not be in breach of their duties to the Union by withholding confidential information from the Union if to disclose it would result in a breach of any other duty or obligation of confidence owed by them; and
- ii. the Trustee shall not be accountable to the Union for any benefit expressly permitted under these Articles which they, or any person who is Connected with them, derives from any matter or from any office, employment, or position.

47. Register of Trustees' interests

47.1 The Trustees must cause a register of Trustees' interests to be kept.

PART 4: UNION COUNCIL

48. Union Council

- 48.1 The Union Council shall have the authority to:
- 48.1.1 represent the voice of the Students;
 - 48.1.2 hold the Sabbatical Officers to account, in accordance with the Bye-Laws;
 - 48.1.3 subject to Article 31.3, set the Policy of the Union and refer Policy to Referenda of the Student Members or to the Student Members at a Student Members' Meeting, in accordance with the Bye-Laws;
 - 48.1.4 make, repeal, and amend the Bye-Laws jointly with the Trustees in accordance with Article 49; and
 - 48.1.5 receive the annual report from the Trustees.
- 48.2 The composition, name, format, and proceedings of the Union Council, alongside any subcommittees or forums associated with the Union Council, shall be set out in the Bye-Laws. No Student Member may hold more than one seat on the Union Council at any one time.

PART 5: ADMINISTRATIVE ARRANGEMENTS AND MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

49. Bye-Laws

- 49.1 The Trustees and Union Council shall have the power from time to time to jointly make, repeal, or amend Bye-Laws as to the management of the Union and its working practices provided that such Bye-Laws shall not be inconsistent with these Articles.

50. Communications by and to the Union

- 50.1 Subject to the Articles and the Companies Acts, any document or information (including any notice, report or accounts), sent or supplied by the Union under the Articles or the Companies Acts may be sent or supplied in any way in which the Companies Act 2006 provides for documents or information which are authorised or required by any provision of that Act to be sent or supplied by the Union, including without limitation:
- 50.1.1 in Hard Copy Form;
 - 50.1.2 in Electronic Form; or
 - 50.1.3 by making it available on a website.
- 50.2 Where a document or information which is required or authorised to be sent or supplied by the Union under the Companies Acts is sent or supplied in Electronic Form or by making it available on a website, the recipient must have agreed that it may be sent or supplied in that form or manner or be deemed to have so agreed under the Companies Acts (and not revoked that agreement). Where any other document or information is sent or supplied in

Electronic Form or made available on a website the Trustees may decide what agreement (if any) is required from the recipient.

- 50.3 Where a document or information which is required or authorised to be sent or supplied by the Union under the Companies Acts is sent or supplied by making it available on a website, the Union must notify the recipient that the document or information is available on the website in accordance with the Companies Acts.
- 50.4 Subject to the Articles, any notice or document to be sent or supplied to a Trustee in connection with the taking of decisions by Trustees may also be sent or supplied by the means by which that Trustee has asked to be sent or supplied with such notices or documents for the time being.
- 50.5 A Company Law Member present in person or by proxy at a meeting of the Union shall be deemed to have received notice of the meeting and the purposes for which it was called.
- 50.6 Any document or information is sent or supplied by the Union to the Company Law Members shall:
- 50.6.1 where it is sent by post it is deemed to have been received forty eight (48) hours (including Saturdays, Sundays, and Public Holidays) after it was posted;
- 50.6.2 where it is sent or supplied by Electronic Means, it is deemed to have been received on the same day that it was sent;
- 50.6.3 where it is sent or supplied by means of a website, it is deemed to have been received:
- i. when the material was first made available on the website; or
 - ii. if later, when the recipient received (or is deemed to have received) notice of the fact that the material was available on the website.
- 50.6.4 Subject to the Companies Acts, a Trustee or any other person (other than in their capacity as a Company Law Member) may agree with the Union that notices or documents sent to that person in a particular way are deemed to have been received within a specified time, and for the specified time to be less than forty eight (48) hours.
- 50.7 Where any document or information has been sent or supplied by the Union by Electronic Means and the Union receives notice that the message is undeliverable:
- 50.7.1 if the document or information has been sent to a Company Law Member or Trustee and is notice of a Company Law Meeting of the Union, the Union is under no obligation to send a Hard Copy of the document or information to the Company Law Members or Trustees postal address as shown in the Union's register of Company Law Members or Trustees, but may in its discretion choose to do so;
- 50.7.2 in all other cases, the Union shall send a Hard Copy of the document or information to the Company Law Member's postal address as shown in the Union's register of Company Law Members (if any), or in the case of a recipient who is not a Company Law Member, to the last known postal address for that person (if any); and

50.7.3 the date of service or delivery of the documents or information shall be the date on which the original electronic communication was sent, notwithstanding the subsequent sending of Hard Copies.

- 50.8 Copies of the Union's annual accounts and reports need not be sent to a person for whom the Union does not have a current address.
- 50.9 Notices of Company Law Meetings need not be sent to a Company Law Member who does not register an address with the Union, or who registers only a postal address outside the United Kingdom, or to a Company Law Member for whom the Union does not have a current address.
- 50.10 The provisions of the Companies Acts shall apply to communications to the Union.
- 50.11 Notwithstanding anything in this Article 50, the Union may send or supply any document or information to Student Members (whether under the Articles or otherwise) in such manner as the Union thinks fit. In particular (but without limitation) if the Union is aware of a Student Member's email address, the Union may communicate with the Student Member using that address, and the Union may communicate with Student Members via its website.
- 50.12 Further provisions governing the Union's communications with its Student Members may be set out in the Bye-Laws.

51. Secretary

- 51.1 A Secretary may be appointed by the Trustees for such term, at such remuneration, and upon such conditions as they may think fit, and may be removed by them. If there is no Secretary:
- 51.1.1 anything authorised or required to be given or sent to, or served on, the Union by being sent to its Secretary may be given or sent to, or served on, the Union itself, and if addressed to the Secretary shall be treated as addressed to the Union; and
- 51.1.2 anything else required or authorised to be done by or to the Secretary of the Union may be done by or to a Trustee, or a person authorised generally or specifically in that behalf by the Trustees.

52. Minutes

- 52.1 The Trustees shall cause minutes to be made in books kept for the purpose:
- 52.1.1 of all appointments of officers made by the Trustees;
- 52.1.2 of all resolutions of the Union and of the Trustees (including, without limitation, decisions of the Trustees made without a meeting); and
- 52.1.3 of all proceedings at meetings of the Union and of the Trustees, and of committees of Trustees, including the names of the Trustees participating in each such meeting and any such minute, if purported to be signed (or in the case of minutes of Trustees' meetings signed or authenticated) by the Chair of the Meeting at which the proceedings were had, or by the chair of the next succeeding meeting, shall, as

against any Member or Trustee of the Union, be sufficient evidence of the proceedings.

52.2 The minutes referred to in Article 52.1 above must be kept for at least ten years from the date of the meeting, resolution, or decision.

52.3 The minutes of the meetings referred to in Article 52.1 above shall normally be considered open and shall be available to the Student Members on the Union's website, except where those minutes relate to any reserved or confidential matters, including without limitation staff-related or disciplinary matters. Copies of the minutes shall also be kept in the Union's offices.

53. Records and accounts

53.1 The Trustees shall comply with the requirements of the Companies Acts and of the Charities Act 2011 as to maintaining a Company Law Members' register, keeping financial records, the audit or examination of accounts, and the preparation and transmission to the Registrar of Companies and the Charity Commission of:

53.1.1 annual reports;

53.1.2 annual returns; and

53.1.3 annual statements of account.

53.2 The Student Members have the right to ask the Trustees questions in writing about the content of any documents referred to in Article 53.1.

54. Irregularities

54.1 The proceedings at any meeting, or on the taking of any poll, or the passing of a written resolution, or the making of any decision, shall not be invalidated by reason of any accidental informality or irregularity (including any accidental omission to give or any non-receipt of notice) or any want of qualification in any of the persons present or voting or by reason of any business being considered which is not specified in the notice.

55. Patrons

55.1 The Trustees may appoint and remove any individual(s) as patron(s) of the Union and on such terms as they shall think fit. A patron shall have the right to be given notice of, to attend and speak (but not vote) at any Student Members' Meeting as if a Student Member and shall also have the right to receive accounts of the Union when available to Student Members.

56. Exclusion of model articles

56.1 The relevant model articles for a company limited by guarantee are hereby expressly excluded.

57. Indemnity

- 57.1 The Union, acting through the Trustees, will have the power to ensure arrangements are made to indemnify all officers and Trustees, appointees, and staff members of the Union against all liability, financial or otherwise, incurred through the execution of their duties, save for the consequences of unlawful or negligent activity on their part if such indemnity is requested by the Trustees.

58. Defined terms

- 58.1 In these Articles, unless the context requires otherwise, the following terms shall have the following meanings:
- 58.1.1 words importing the singular shall include the plural and vice versa;
 - 58.1.2 subject to Article 58.4, any reference in these Articles to an enactment includes a reference to that enactment as re-enacted or amended from time to time and to any subordinate legislation made under it; and

“Board of Trustees” or “Board”	the board of Trustees of the Union;
“Bye-Laws”	the bye-laws setting out the working practices of the Union made from time to time in accordance with Article 49;
“Canterbury Christ Church University” and “the University”	Canterbury Christ Church University, incorporated as a company limited by guarantee on 10 June 2003;
“Chair”	the chair of the Board of Trustees appointed in accordance with Article 43.1;
“Chair of the Meeting”	in the case of Trustees’ meetings means the person chairing the meeting in accordance with Article 43;
“Chief Executive Officer”	the chief executive of the Union who is appointed by the Board of Trustees;
“Circulation Date”	in relation to a written resolution, has the meaning given to it in the Companies Acts;
“clear days”	in relation to the period of a notice, that period excluding the day when the notice is given or deemed to be given and the day for which it is given or on which it is to take effect;
“Code of Practice”	the code of practice relating to Canterbury Christ Church University’s obligations under Section 22 of the Education Act;
“Community Trustee”	a Trustee appointed in accordance with Article 24 who for the avoidance of doubt shall not be deemed to be either a major union office holder or a sabbatical union office holder for the purposes of Section 22 of the Education Act;
“Companies Acts”	the Companies Acts (as defined in Section 2 of the Companies Act 2006), in so far as they apply to the Union;
“Company Law Meeting”	a general meeting of the Company Law Members for the purposes of the Companies Acts;

“Company Law Members”	members of the Union for the purposes of the Companies Acts, as defined in Article 13;
“Connected Person”	any person falling within one of the following categories and where payment to that person might result in the Trustee obtaining benefit: (a) any spouse, civil partner, parent, child, brother, sister, grandparent or grandchild of a Trustee; or (b) the spouse or civil partner of any person in (a); or (c) any person living with a Trustee or their partner; or (d) any company or LLP or firm of which a Trustee is a paid director, member, partner or employee, or shareholder holding more than 1% of the capital;
“Deputy Chair”	the deputy chair of the Board of Trustees appointed in accordance with Article 43.2;
“document”	includes summons, notice, order or other legal process and includes, unless otherwise specified, any document sent or supplied in Electronic Form;
“Education Act”	the Education Act 1994;
“Elected Officers”	the Sabbatical Officers and the Part-Time Officers;
“Electronic Form” and “Electronic Means”	have the meanings respectively given to them in Section 1168 of the Companies Act 2006;
“Financial Expert”	an individual, company or firm who is authorised to give investment advice under the Financial Services and Markets Act 2000;
“Hard Copy” and “Hard Copy Form”	have the meanings respectively given to them in the Companies Act 2006;
“Members”	the Student Members and the Company Law Members;
“Part-Time Officers”	the Student Members elected in accordance with the Bye-Laws to be officers of the Union while continuing their studies at Canterbury Christ Church University;
“patron”	a supporter of the Union who, for the avoidance of doubt, shall not be a Trustee or a Company Law Member;
“Policy”	representative and campaigning policy set by Referenda or by the Union Council in accordance with Article 17 and Article 48 respectively or by the Student Members at a Student Members’ meeting;
“Public Holiday”	Christmas Day, Good Friday and any day that is a bank holiday under the Banking and Financial Dealings Act 1971 in the part of the United Kingdom where the Union is registered;
“RaG”	the raise and give society which develops students by providing them with an opportunity to raise funds for charitable causes;

“Referendum”	a ballot in which all Student Members are entitled to cast a vote, the protocol for which shall be set out in the Bye-Laws;
“Sabbatical Officers”	the individuals elected in accordance with Article 22 (each of whom is a “major union office holder” for the purposes of section 22 of the Education Act);
“Sabbatical Trustee”	a Trustee elected in accordance with Article 22;
“Secure Petition”	a written request to the Union which shall be fixed in a pre-arranged place or places or held securely on-line;
“Special Members”	a type of associate membership of the Union as further defined in Article 15;
“special resolution”	a resolution of the Company Law Members: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● on a show of hands at a Company Law Meeting by a majority of at least 75% of Company Law Members who, being entitled to vote, do so in person or by proxy. ● on a poll at a Company Law Meeting, Company Law Members representing at least 75% of the total voting rights of the Company Law Members who, being entitled to vote, do so in person or by proxy. ● on a written resolution, by the Company Law Members representing at least 75% of the total voting rights of all eligible Company Law Members.
“Student”	An individual who is registered in accordance with published requirements set out by Canterbury Christ Church University relating to student registration. For the avoidance of doubt, Canterbury Christ Church University shall determine whether or not an individual has Student status;
“Student Members”	student members of the Union being Students at Canterbury Christ Church University as further defined in Article 11.1.1 and the Sabbatical Officers;
“Student Trustee”	a Trustee elected in accordance with Article 23.1 who is a Student and who, for the avoidance of doubt, shall not be a major union office holder for the purposes of Section 22 of the Education Act;
“Subsidiary Company”	any company in which the Union holds more than 50% of the shares, controls more than 50% of the voting rights attached to the shares or has the right to appoint a majority of the board of the company;
“Trustees”	the directors of the Union as defined in Article 21;
“Union”	Christ Church Students’ Union;
“Union Council”	the Student body elected by and selected from Students constituted in accordance with these Articles and the Bye-Laws of the Union;

- “University Trustee”** a Trustee appointed in accordance with Article 25 who, for the avoidance of doubt, shall not be a major union office holder for the purposes of Section 22 of the Education Act;
- “writing”** the representation or reproduction of words, symbols or other information in a visible form by any method or combination of methods, whether sent or supplied in Electronic Form or otherwise; and
- “written resolution”** a resolution of the Company Law Members proposed and passed in writing in accordance with the Companies Acts.
